### Mason Clinic-Pediatrics Expands Child Literacy With Reach Out And Read Partnership



SHELTON -- Since 2003, Mason Health has participated in the Reach Out and Read program at Mason Clinic-Pediatrics. At each well-child checkup for children from infancy through age 5, Mason Clinic pediatricians offer advice to caregivers about early relationships and literacy and give children a new book to take home to build their home libraries.

In 2024, Mason Clinic provided books to 1,113 families at well-child visits and served 1,328 families through additional resources. This partnership is in alignment with Mason Health's Vision to Provide the Best Patient-Centered Care in the Pacific Northwest, by empowering parents with the tools to help children be successful. Since 2003, Mason Clinic-Pediatrics has provided 39,524 books to families.

"Mason Clinic is proud to work in partnership with Reach out and Read to ensure that children and families receive the best support possible," said Clinic Manager Christine Dawson.

"We achieve this through continual assessment of program quality metrics like provider training, availability of high quality and developmentally appropriate children's books.

Since providing additional as community resources to families, ies. and ensuring that all levels of our clinical staff and health system are aware of and supportive of Reach Out and Read."

> Reach Out and Read is an evidencebased program proven to show results for children and families and improve the quality of health care. More than 20 studies demonstrate impact, scale, reach, and effectiveness. Findings show that when families receive Reach Out and Read, parents are two and a half times more likely to read to their children, and children's language development is improved by three to six months.

> Research also links Reach Out and Read to improvements in children's social-emotional development and decreases in parental stress. Clinicians have improved relationships with families and improved clinic culture and commitment to local communities. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends ROR as an essential component of pediatric care and a strategy to buffer toxic stress.

Mason Health Foundation's new name and initiatives reflect a dedication to the community that goes beyond health care, ensuring that every resident has access to the tools and resources they need to thrive and achieve their best health.

The Foundation board looks forward to fulfilling its mission with strategic fundraising efforts this year. Newly launched programs include a car seat program at the Mason Health Birth Center. The new car seat program will help educate new parents about how to use car seats. The car seat program is funded through a restricted fund for pediatric patients within the Foundation's Endowment Fund. The Endowment Fund allocated \$2,000 toward the program last year and it is expected to continue in perpetuity.

The Foundation has already scheduled two summer events this year to support fundraising for new medical equipment at Mason General Hospital — the Quality Care Open Golf Tournament is scheduled for Friday, July 11, and will raise funds for a new high-field open MRI, while Bikers for Babies is scheduled for Saturday, Aug. 9, and will raise funds for medical equipment at the Birth Center.

#### Clinic Concierge Volunteers:

- Individuals must be 16+
- Need coverage for Mondays 8am-12pm and Thursdays either 8am-12pm or 12pm-3pm

#### **ED Concierge Volunteers:**

- Individuals must be 18+
- Afternoon and evening shifts are available all week, with morning coverage needed Friday and Saturday.
- Priority coverage afternoons/early evenings

#### **Culinary Volunteers:**

- Individuals must be 18+
- One shift opening evenings 4 to 7 p.m.

#### **NODA Volunteers:**

- 3-hour shifts on-call
- Likely won't have more than 2 or 3 call-ins per year, and shift coverage based on availability

#### **Chaplain Volunteers:**

- Must meet requirements listed in the Chaplain Volunteer position description (available on our volunteer website); 18+
- 3-hour shifts weekly, with rotating on-call weeks
- Meetings monthly

#### **Office Volunteers:**

- Individuals must be 16+
- Assist the Development office with editing, marketing, fundraising, program assistance, event planning and more!
- 3-hour shifts weekly, Monday-Friday, 8am-4:30pm
